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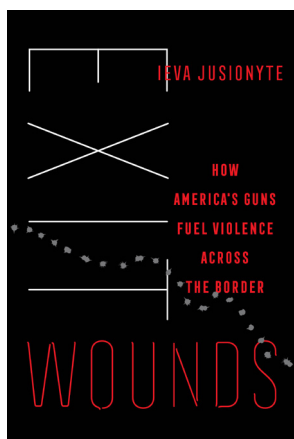
LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

***Publishing is not just an ideas-driven business—
it is a people-driven business.***

The 2025 fiscal year marked a pivotal milestone for the University of California Press. With the support of our Board of Directors, the Press embarked on a new growth-oriented strategic plan grounded in the progressive, equity-focused mission and values that we share with our parent institution. As I reflect on this plan, I realize that it's not just about numbers—it's about people and the deep connections we maintain with our communities.

The engagement of our community of authors, journal editors, and peer reviewers remains central to our success as a publisher. That success was on full display when we received the R. R. Hawkins Award of the Association of American Publishers for Ieva Jusionyte's *Exit Wounds: How America's Guns Fuel Violence Across the Border*. *Exit Wounds* was published as a part of our California Series in Public Anthropology. This series, this book, and books like it play a vital role in shaping public debate—an urgent need in these turbulent and unpredictable times. Many of our journals similarly address pressing issues, such as an article in our open access journal *Collabra: Psychology* by Subramanya Prasad Chandrashekar of the Norwegian University of Science and Technology, "Communicated and Perceived Public Consensus About Climate Change."

The UC Press Foundation is deepening our engagement with long-standing and new supporters alike. This year, Iris Jamahl Dunkle inspired supporters with her talk on *Riding Like the Wind: The Life of Sanora Babb*, her book that was praised by *The New York Times*. At another event, Natalia Molina, author of *A Place at the Nayarit: How a Mexican Restaurant Nourished a Community*, provided a window into how her grandmother's restaurant helped knit together ethnic Mexicans and other Latinx Los Angeles residents. The Foundation remains essential in helping us amplify underrepresented voices.

FIRSTGEN PROGRAM

Launched in 2021, the UC Press FirstGen Program supports the work of first-generation scholars—those who are the first in their family to receive a college degree. First-gen scholars have important stories to tell from unique perspectives, and it is our goal to provide space and support for these stories. To that end, UC Press provides first-gen authors with community-building opportunities, resources for navigating publication, and grants to assist them in writing and publishing their books. The program is home to authors across disciplines, and UC Press has published 40 books in the program to date.

This year the FirstGen Program launched a new offering that leads a cohort of first-gen authors through a series of brown bag events. Led by UC Press staff, these gatherings provide a space to learn what to expect from publishing at UC Press, ask questions, and share insights and experiences. We have received overwhelmingly positive feedback from our participating authors.

The enhanced support offered through the UC Press FirstGen Program benefits all authors, especially those who are new to publishing.

Publishing for Urgent Times

UC Press authors contribute original perspectives and critical context to the most important public and scholarly conversations of our time.

UC Press publishes bold, field-defining books in the arts, sciences, humanities, and social sciences. The books we publish are more important than ever—and we are more committed than ever to their success.

Our authors tackle urgent subjects—migration, gender and sexuality, race and ethnicity, inequality, environment and climate, colonialism and resistance, technology and society, labor, and more. And this work has an impact. Tanya Golash-Boza, author of *Before Gentrification: The Creation of DC's Racial Wealth Gap*, has collaborated with the nonprofit organization Empower DC to apply her research findings in testimony for a zoning case, highlighting how proposed changes could lead to the displacement of Black residents from DC.

Whether gentrification or another of these urgent topics, they are often too big for one discipline to address; they need economists to talk with ecologists, sociologists to talk with policymakers. Our books bring interdisciplinary, forward-thinking scholarship to other scholars, students, activists, and readers who hunger for deeply researched insights into these critical issues. For example, Lisa Young Larance's *Broken: Women's Stories of Intimate and Institutional Harm and Repair* has been picked up widely among practitioner groups, influencing the ways professionals are approaching their work with women and the institutions they navigate, such as parole.

UC Press looks for ideas that will shape the academy and the world in the years to come. We bring together fresh voices with more seasoned ones, and we actively seek out underrepresented scholars. We proudly

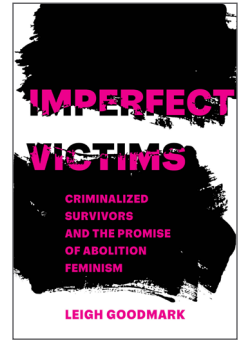
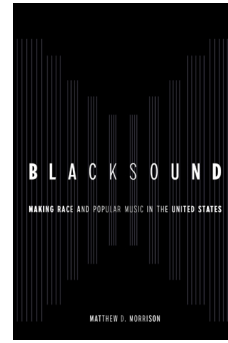
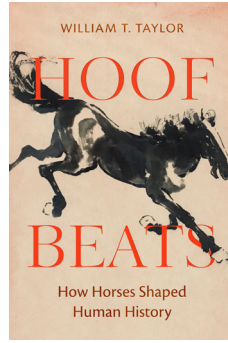
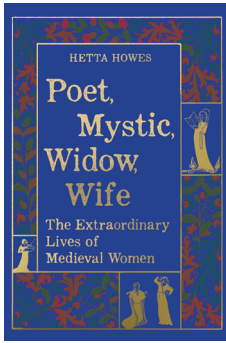
partner with scholars and thought leaders who aim to change minds, movements, and policies, many of whom identify as scholar-activists and bring academic research and theory to life with vivid storytelling. Orisanmi Burton's *Tip of the Spear: Black Radicalism, Prison Repression, and the Long Attica Revolt* retells the story and lasting influence of the deadly 1971 Attica prison rebellion and changes the way we understand the history of Black radical organizing and carcerality in the United States. Hailed as a "masterpiece," it received substantive reviews in outlets like *The Nation* and the *Los Angeles Review of Books* and was selected for multiple popular book groups, including the Noname Book Club. The book was banned in prison systems in New York, Florida, Michigan, and California, where it is now "contraband."

Changing the Discourse—From Prestigious Academic Journals to Prominent Media

With support from our publicity team, we lift up our authors to ensure that their transformative ideas reach the perfect audiences to fuel informed conversations and debates. Top journals regularly review our scholarly books, including the *Journal of Economic Literature*, the *Journal of Asian Studies*, *American Anthropologist*, the *American Journal of Sociology*, and others. Our authors appear in opinion pages, on radio shows, on podcasts, in online magazines, and in influential blogs and are featured in media like NPR, *The Guardian*, *The Economist*, *Salon*, *The Wall Street Journal*, *The Washington Post*, *The Nation*, *Mother Jones*, and *Fast Company*, among other outlets. Beyond mainstream coverage, our books resonate with special-interest outlets that engage focused, passionate readers—publications like *Psychology Today*, the feminist magazine *Dame*, the environmental journal *Nature*, and *Jadaliyya*, which focuses on the Middle East.



This year, UC Press publications have captured the spotlight with over 1,100 media hits, including:

- Three of our Fall 2024 books—Hetta Howes’s *Poet, Mystic, Widow, Wife*, Iris Jamahl Dunkle’s *Riding Like the Wind*, and William T. Taylor’s *Hoof Beats*—received major coverage and reviews in *The New York Times*.
- *Rolling Stone* magazine named Matthew D. Morrison’s *Blacksound* one of the Best Music Books of 2024.
- UC Press author Leigh Goodmark (*Imperfect Victims*) was the subject of a major profile in *The New Yorker*.

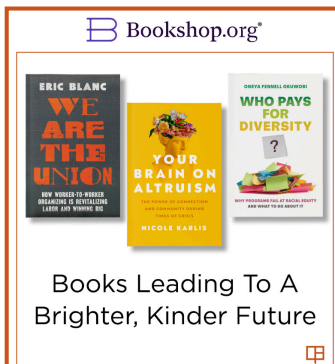
Marketing—Reaching Wide and Far

We support the reach of our authors and their critical ideas through creative marketing campaigns that maximize impact across a range of important audiences, including librarians, students and faculty, book buyers, and booksellers.

UC Press draws nearly 2 million annual visitors to our website and

runs more than 500 targeted email campaigns spanning disciplines from history to sociology, art to science, and more. Our robust presence on social media combines organic content and paid promotions to connect with readers and grow a loyal following across platforms, totaling 54,600 followers across actively managed channels.

UC Press drives discoverability and sales through targeted advertising and curated campaigns on



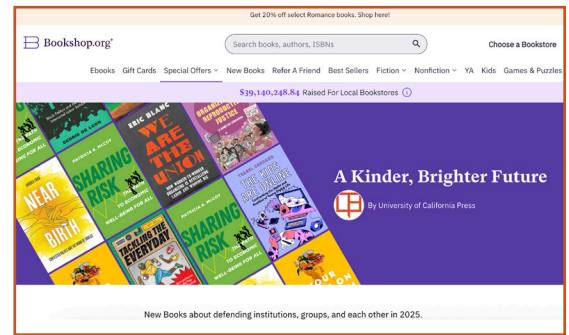
platforms like Bookshop.org and Amazon. On Bookshop.org, thematic lists such as “A Kinder, Brighter Future” and “The Vietnam War, Refugees, and Identity” have spotlighted socially conscious titles and commemorated historical anniversaries, reinforcing the Press’s leadership in publishing on justice and human rights. Strategic third-party partnerships with mission-aligned media outlets also play a key role in the Press’s outreach to engaged, informed audiences. A campaign for Zinga A. Fraser’s *Shirley Chisholm in Her Own Words: Speeches and Writings* on Jacobin.com drove 1,550 clicks, while Shoumita Dasgupta’s *Where Biology Ends and Bias Begins: Lessons on Belonging from Our DNA* earned *Discover* magazine’s highest newsletter click count of 2025.

UC Press engages directly with independent booksellers at industry events like the American Booksellers Association’s Winter Institute. Through exhibits, galley giveaways, and presentations, the Press nurtures relationships that translate into word-of-mouth recommendations to independent bookstores and wider retail support.

Awarded for Excellence

Each year, UC Press books earn numerous awards from prestigious academic societies and associations, underscoring their invaluable contributions to scholarship. This year alone our books were winners and finalists for an impressive 128 awards, including for these books from first-time authors:

- Alix Johnson, *Where Cloud Is Ground: Placing Data and Making Place in Iceland*, Society for Cinema and Media Studies, Best First Book Prize

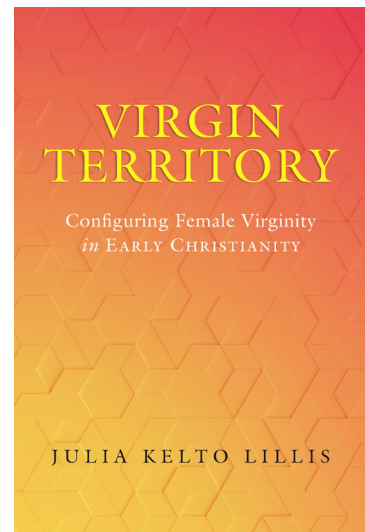
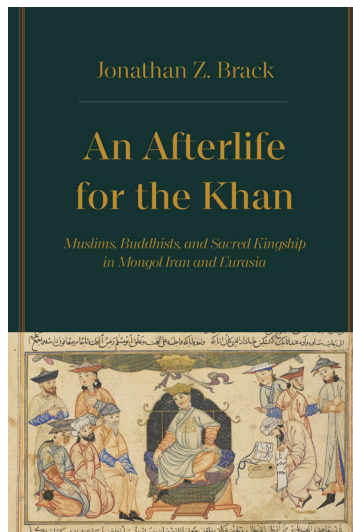
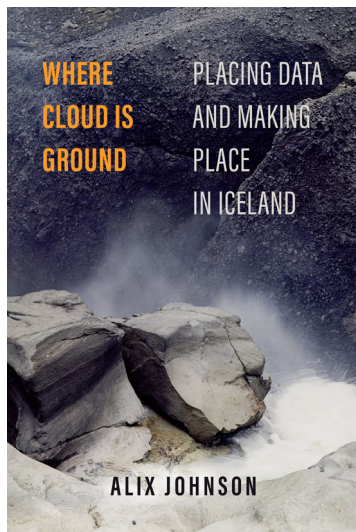


UC Press Makes the Leap to Bluesky

In November 2024, Bluesky saw a surge in users driven by dissatisfaction with X (formerly Twitter), including concerns about privacy, moderation, and rising misinformation. During this shift, UC Press’s Bluesky account gained significant followers and engagement, even with limited activity. In response, we have increased our presence on Bluesky and stopped posting on X, which no longer serves our academic community as it once did.

- April 2024: UC Press Bluesky account created
- November 2024: Account increases to 1,700 followers with limited activity
- January 2025: UC Press migrates posting from X to Bluesky and followers increase to 8,000+
- June 2025: UC Press experiences consistent growth with 12,100 followers

Many UC Press authors have been recognized with MacArthur Fellowships through the years, including Jason De León, Kelly Lytle Hernández, Loretta J. Ross, Natalia Molina, Ramón A. Gutiérrez, and Josh Kun, for work spanning anthropology, history, reproductive justice, and cultural criticism. This year, we were thrilled to see Gustavo Arellano, coauthor of *A People’s Guide to Orange County*, named a 2025 finalist for the Pulitzer Prize for Commentary.

Series Highlight—Critical Refugee Studies

Edited by the Critical Refugee Studies Collective, the Critical Refugee Studies series publishes provocative books that explore the rich and complex lived worlds of refugees. These books privilege the concerns, perspectives, knowledge production, and global imaginings of refugees, involuntary migrants, asylum seekers, and internally displaced and stateless human beings. Four books in the series are by first-time authors

and 10 series authors are first-gen, a reflection of how the series champions new voices. In April 2025, the series published its eighth book, *The Cleaving: Vietnamese Writers in the Diaspora*, edited by Isabelle Thuy

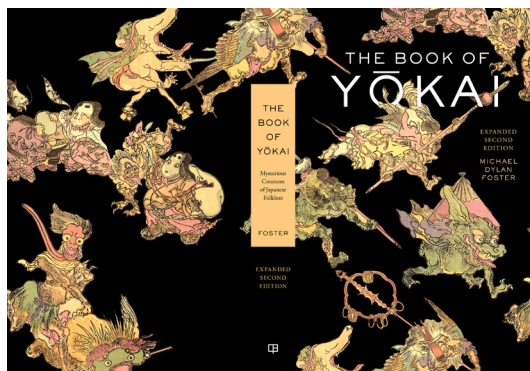
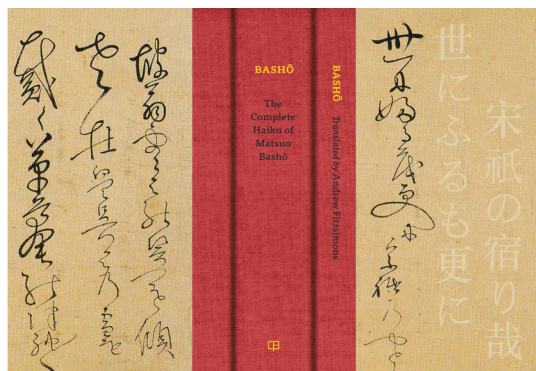

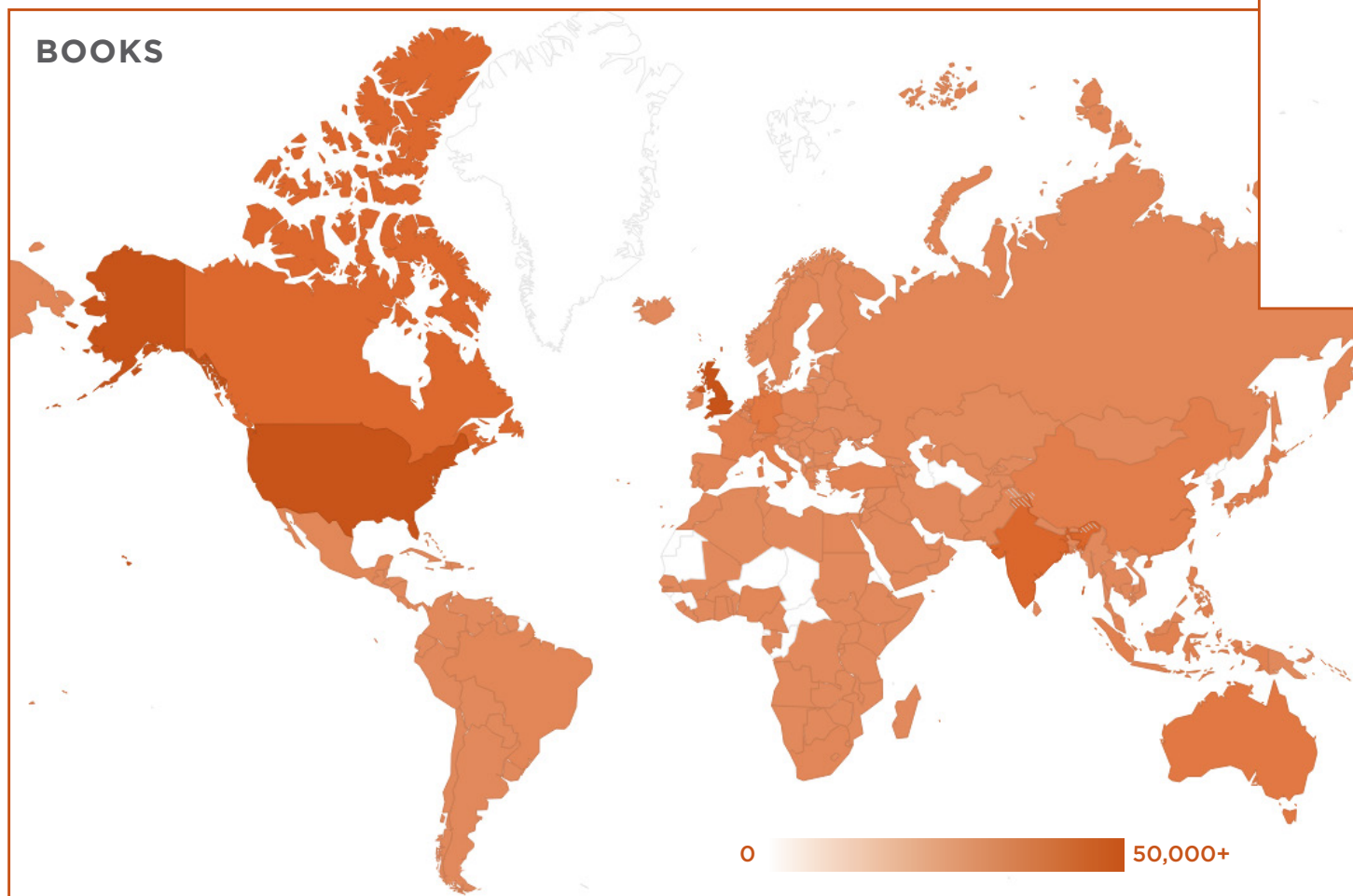


UC Press Designs Shine

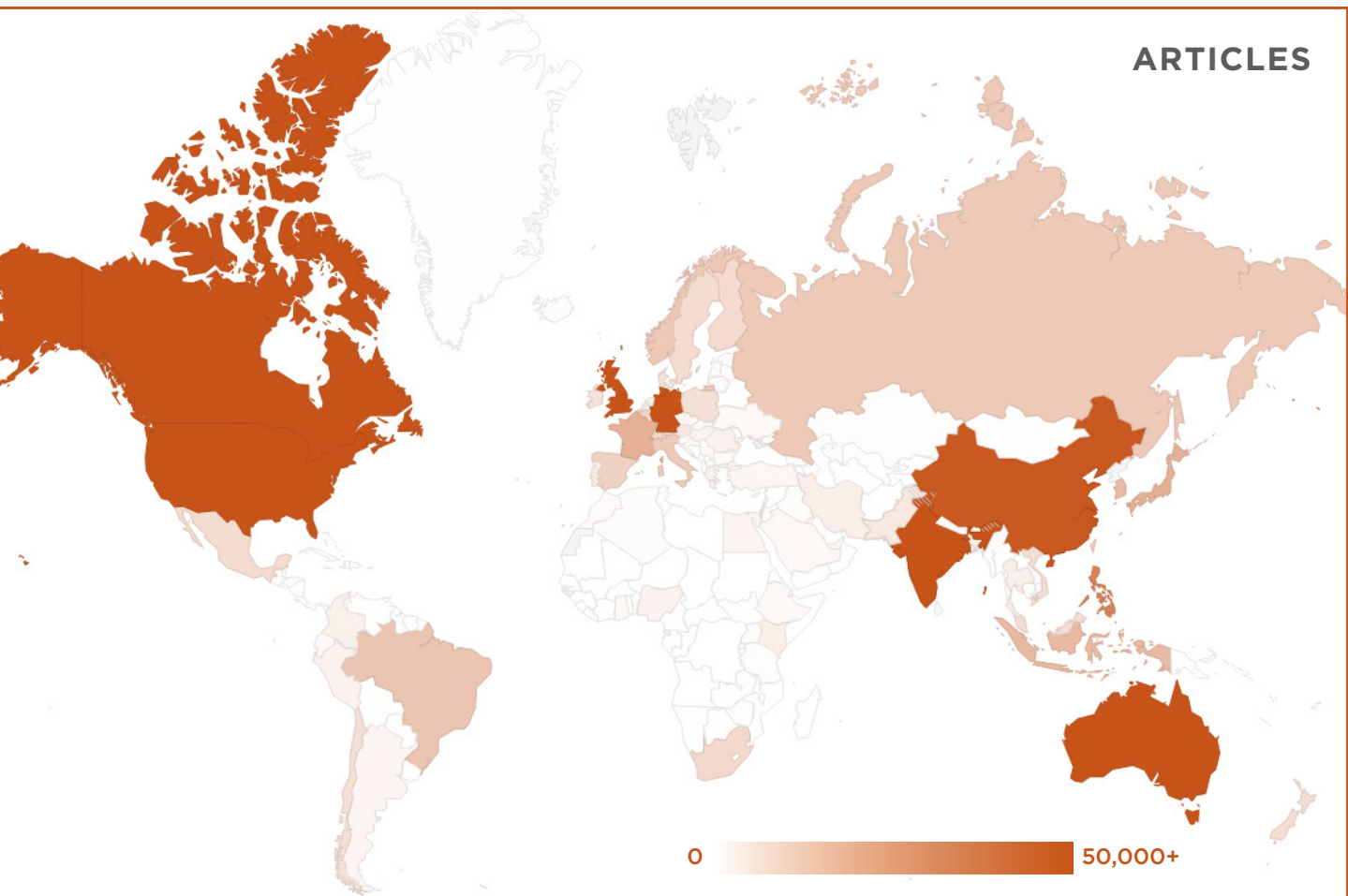

GLOBAL REACH THROUGH OPEN ACCESS

Since the launch of our open access program in 2015, UC Press has published over 230 open access books and hundreds of open access scholarly journal articles in electronic formats that are free to read. With the same high standards for selection, peer review, production, and marketing as the Press's traditional publishing program, this transformative open access publishing model extends the reach of our authors around the globe. With five fully open access journals and three subscription journals offering open access options, UC Press remains committed to this vital part of our publishing program.

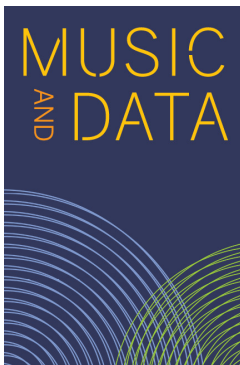
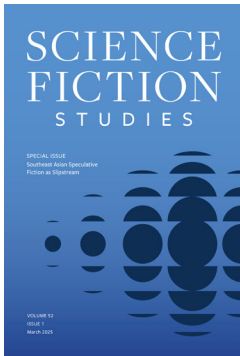

UC Press is a highly respected publisher of scholarly journals, which are an integral part of our overall publishing program. We publish 42 journals in a wide variety of subject areas and disciplines, primarily in the humanities and social sciences, and many in collaboration with respected scholarly organizations.

This year we were proud to publish the inaugural issue of *Animal History* and the first UC Press issues of *Aztlán: A Journal of Chicano Studies*, the *Journal of Religion and Popular Culture*, *Science Fiction Studies*, and the *Journal of Japanese Studies*.

Our journals also publish noteworthy articles addressing current events and global politics. Examples from this year include:

- “Israel, Palestine, and the Road to October 7: Dead End or Deadly Detour?,” by Nathan J. Brown (George Washington University), published in *Current History*
- “Beyond Hedging? Japanese and South Korean Responses to US–China Competition,” by Ramon Pacheco Pardo (King’s College London) et al., published in *Asian Survey*
- “A Power Elite Alliance and Local Environmental Policy: Elon Musk in Cameron County,” by Michelle Keck (University of Texas Rio Grande Valley) and Guadalupe Correa-Cabrera (George Mason University), published in *Case Studies in the Environment*

Each year our journals program affords us the opportunity to interact with a global community of scholars in various roles. This year we published more than 1,800 articles, essays, book reviews, and other journal content representing the work of thousands of authors, editors, and peer reviewers around the world.

Usage and Reach

This year more than 3 million readers in over 70 countries accessed UC Press journals content. Outside the United States, our journals were accessed most in China, the United Kingdom, Canada, Singapore, the Philippines, Australia, India, and Germany.

Impact

- 81% of our journals are indexed in Scopus
- 53% of our Scopus-indexed journals experienced an increase in their CiteScore
- *Collabra: Psychology* experienced the largest CiteScore increase, from 3.6 to 4.6
- 74% of our journals have impact factors
- 39% of our ranked journals experienced an increase in their impact factors
- *Global Perspectives* received its first impact factor
- *Current History* experienced the largest impact factor increase, from 2.4 to 4.2
- *Elementa: Science of the Anthropocene* enjoys the highest impact factor of our program at 4.5 and the highest CiteScore at 7.8

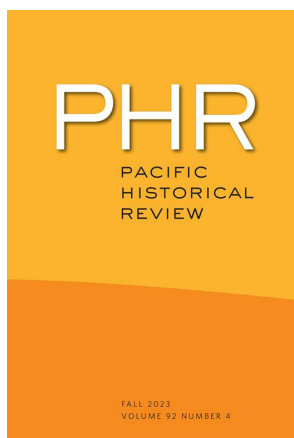

This year, the Foundation expanded our outreach efforts through engaging with new donors at academic conferences, communicating news and programs to new audiences, cohosting four author presentation events, and recruiting three new members to the UC Press Foundation Board of Trustees. Other 2025 Foundation highlights include:

- We secured gifts from 265 donors/members—an increase of 100% over the number of supporters from 2024.
- We provided \$1,304,290 in support to the Press. This is 19% more than the five-year average annual contribution, 2020–24.
- The current value of Foundation endowments is \$21,800,000, an increase of 3% over last year.
