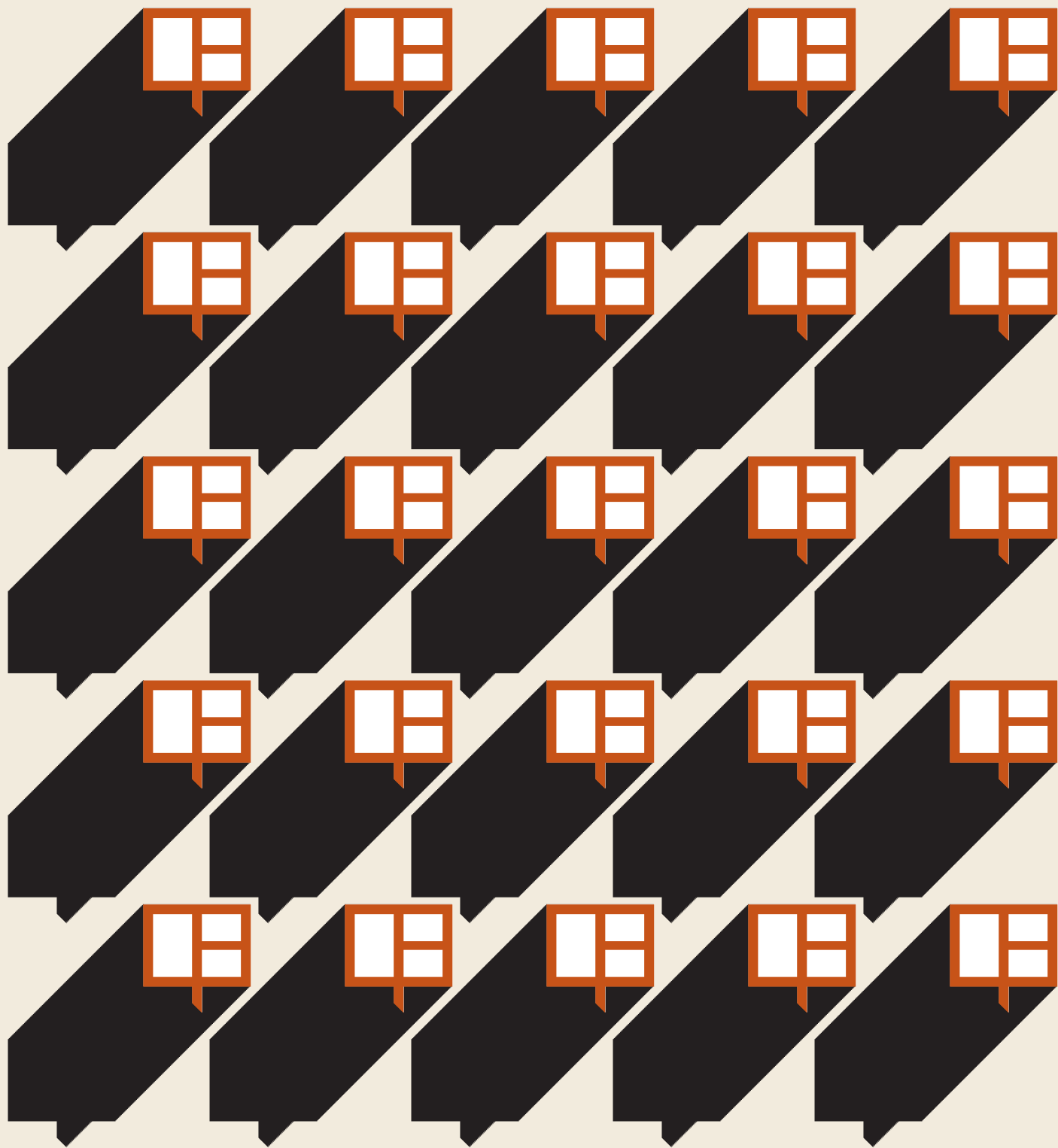

Dear Friend of UC Press,

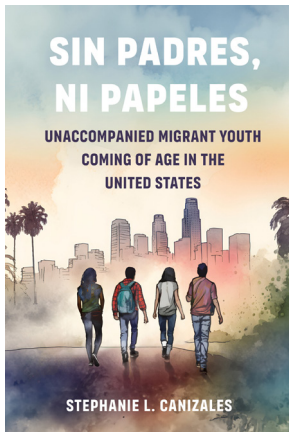

In times like these, the University of California Press's distinctive brand of fiercely independent publishing remains vital as we seek to understand our world and drive positive change.

Our work often meets the moment in important ways. This is certainly the case with our new book series Co-Opting AI, edited by Mona Sloane. Moving beyond the hype cycle, this series seeks to address the disruptive social and cultural impacts of artificial intelligence. Professor Sloane kicks off the series with her own book, *Predicted: How AI Is Restructuring Social Life*, an opening salvo that is sure to spark conversation about these pervasive technologies.

Increasingly, the value of UC Press publishing lies in its ability to engage critical issues with authority, depth, and credibility. UC Berkeley professor Stephanie L. Canizales recently shared a moving account of her research at a UC Press Foundation event to support our FirstGen Program. Her book, *Sin Padres, Ni Papeles: Unaccompanied Migrant Youth Coming of Age in the United States*, chronicles the incredible challenges facing unaccompanied minors as they transition to life in the United States.

Our journals program also continues to push boundaries and bring scholarship to a larger public audience. This year, the editors of *Global Perspectives* are innovating in the delivery of scholarship by incorporating podcasts into the journal. This allows researchers' ideas and concepts to reach a broad audience and enables scholars to leverage them in their research.

As we embark on another year, the staff of UC Press look forward to further innovations in how we connect with our readers. In the pages of this annual report, you will see many examples of what has



made UC Press so distinctive and successful over our long history: our willingness to break new ground and drive change by engaging with the broadest possible audience. We look forward to collaborating with you as we continue our journey, and we thank you for your support.

PUBLISHING SERVICES @ UC PRESS

This year, UC Press has taken a major step forward in expanding support for University of California scholarship through Publishing Services @ UC Press, a collaboration between the Press and the California Digital Library. A long-term strategic vision has become an active operation with the addition of program manager Elizabeth Scarpelli and the onboarding of our first two affiliates, the Institute of East Asian Studies and the Innovation and Entrepreneurship Council, both out of UC Berkeley.

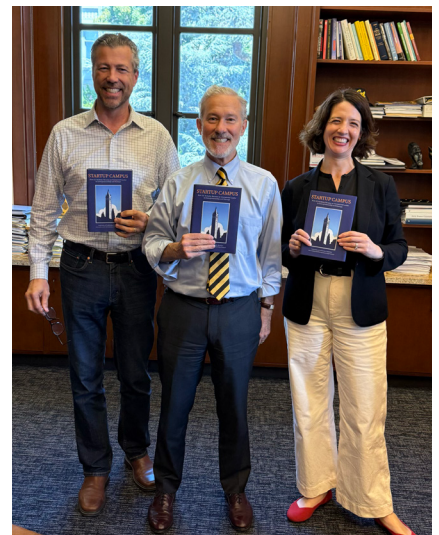
Designed to serve UC research centers, academic programs, institutes, and administrative departments, Publishing Services fills a critical need across the university system: it offers professional publishing support that allows academic units to retain editorial independence while publishing under their own names. Services include editorial development, production, fulfillment, and distribution to meet the needs of programs at different stages of growth.

In partnership with UC Berkeley's Innovation and Entrepreneurship Council, Publishing Services supported the publication of our first project, *Startup Campus: How UC Berkeley Became an Unexpected Leader in Entrepreneurship and Startups*.

Publishing Services reflects the Press's commitment to innovation during a period of significant change in higher education, while also creating new opportunities for UC affiliates to extend the reach and impact of their work.

FIRSTGEN PROGRAM

The UC Press FirstGen Program cultivates and supports the work of first-generation scholars—those who are the first in their family to earn a degree from a four-year institution. UC Press FirstGen authors receive an outright grant and are invited to a series of staff-led brown bag events mapped onto the publishing experience. Topics of these discussions range from book cover design to copyediting, indexing to promotion. Our FirstGen authors deeply appreciate the opportunity to connect directly with publishing professionals and other first-gen scholars.

Our latest public webinar featured two UC Press FirstGen authors alongside two UC Press publishing professionals to discuss the challenges and strategies of navigating higher education. Of the more than 130 attendees, 90 percent identified as first-gen and 60 percent as early career.

BOOKS

Book Publishing for Urgent Times

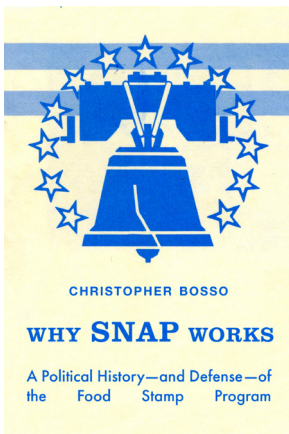
At UC Press, we publish bold, field-defining books across the arts, sciences, humanities, and social sciences. In a world shaped by rapid change, contested narratives, and urgent social challenges, our publishing program brings rigorous, deeply researched scholarship into the conversations that matter most.

When new topics dominate headlines and demand immediate understanding, UC Press authors are often already shaping the discourse. Because their books are grounded in years of careful research, UC Press authors provide essential context when we most need it.

A striking example is Christopher Bosso's *Why SNAP Works: A Political History—and Defense—of the Food Stamp Program*. Published in 2024, before renewed attacks on food assistance programs, the book positioned Bosso as a leading public voice when SNAP came under fire in 2025. Through op-eds and appearances across outlets including NPR, *Jacobin*, *Ms. Magazine*, and *Axios*, he helped bring rigorous scholarship into a fast-moving public debate.

Similarly, major media outlets called on UC Press author Marion Nestle to contextualize the “Make America Healthy Again” movement, including a major profile of her and her work in *The New York Times*, “At 88, a Nutritionist Meets Her Moment.” Drawing on decades of research reflected in her many UC Press books, including the field-defining *Food Politics: How the Food Industry Influences Nutrition and Health*, Nestle helped audiences distinguish fact from misinformation during crucial public health debates.

These examples underscore a core strength of our program: We publish experts whose work stands ready to inform the public when it matters most. By investing in rigorous and forward-looking scholarship, UC Press helps position our authors to respond to a changing world.



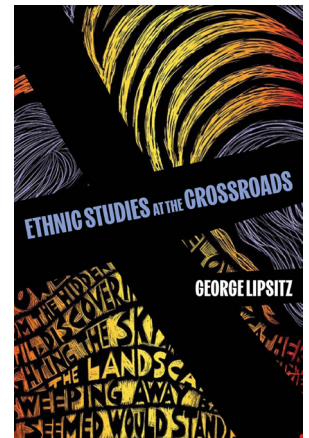
Bold Scholarship in the Fight Against Misinformation

At a time when climate science, public health, gender studies, and ethnic studies are subject to political attack, UC Press remains steadfast in publishing bold, peer-reviewed scholarship in these areas and more. UC Press authors tackle pressing issues that are core to academic inquiry and sit at the heart of public debate, including migration, gender and sexuality, race and ethnicity, inequality, environment and climate, colonialism and resistance, technology and society, labor, and more. Titles like *Ethnic Studies at the Crossroads*, by George Lipsitz, exemplify this commitment. Lipsitz's work reflects on the field's contested history and evolving future, offering a deeply informed perspective when ethnic studies departments risk elimination across the country.

In an era of misinformation, peer-reviewed scholarship matters more than ever. Every UC Press book undergoes rigorous review to ensure the highest standards of scholarly integrity. Our authors use ethnography, archival research, qualitative and quantitative analysis, and other data-driven methods to build nuanced, evidence-based arguments. Sanyu Mojola's *Death by Design: Producing Racial Health Inequality in the Shadow of the Capitol*, for example, draws on archival sources, oral histories, census records, disease surveillance data, vital statistics, and historical mapping. This commitment to methodological breadth allows us to publish work grounded in discipline-specific rigor that equips scholars, students, policymakers, and general readers with tools to think critically and navigate complex issues.

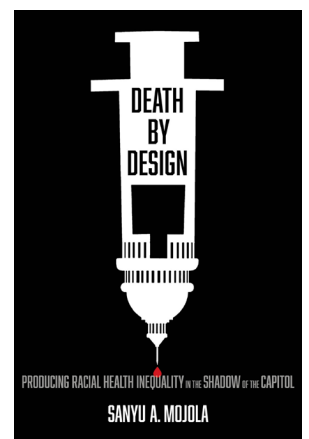
Recognition in the Academy and Beyond

In partnership with our authors, we amplify their work through media engagement, public events, and digital platforms, reaching audiences across both scholarly and mainstream channels. Leading academic journals regularly review our titles, including the *Journal of Economic*

Literature, American Anthropologist, and the *American Journal of Sociology*, among others. At the same time, public-facing media—from NPR and *The Guardian* to *The Economist* and *The Nation*—call on our authors for their insights. This past year, Seth Berkley's *Fair Doses: An Insider's Story of the Pandemic and the Global Fight for Vaccine Equity* was reviewed in *The Lancet*, *Nature*, and *The Economist*, demonstrating its relevance across both scholarly and policy spheres. Meanwhile, Misty

L. Heggeness, author of *Swiftynomics: How Women Mastermind and Redefine Our Economy*, reached a wide popular audience through coverage in *USA Today*, CBS News, *The New Republic*, and *Vox*, along with appearances on dozens of podcasts. A review in *The New Yorker* of Matthew D. C. Larsen and Mark Letteney's *Ancient Mediterranean Incarceration* highlighted UC Press's interdisciplinary strengths, bridging classical studies and contemporary debates in carceral studies.

As traditional book review coverage contracts, we continue to reach out to specialized outlets that connect with deeply engaged readerships, including podcasts, newsletters, and substacks. For example, Emily Mendenhall's *Invisible Illness: A History, from Hysteria to Long COVID* found a curious audience through events and targeted podcast appearances, while our biography of disability rights activist Ed Roberts, *An Independent Man: Ed Roberts and the Fight for Disability Rights*, by Scot Danforth, connected with readers through disability-focused and Bay Area-based programming.

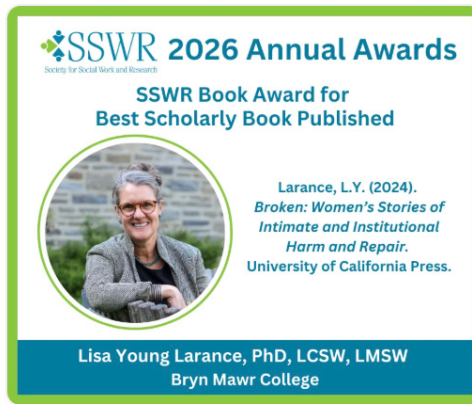


Emily Mendenhall signs copies of her book, *Invisible Illness: A History, from Hysteria to Long COVID*, at Politics and Prose in Washington, DC.

Each year, UC Press titles earn awards from an array of academic societies and professional organizations, underscoring their impact across disciplines. This year's honors included several prizes for debut authors, reflecting our commitment to cultivating new voices. First-time author Lisa Young Larence won the 2026 Best Scholarly Book Award from the Society for Social Work and Research for *Broken: Women's Stories of Intimate and Institutional Harm and Repair*. Our authors also receive prestigious individual recognitions, including MacArthur Fellowships, Guggenheim Fellowships, membership in the American Academy of Arts and Science, and other national awards. In 2025, UC Press author and series editor Ieva Jusionyte joined the ranks of previous UC Press MacArthur Fellows: Jason De León, Paul Farmer, Kelly Lytle Hernández, Natalia Molina, and Loretta Ross.

Expanding Access

Central to the UC Press mission is expanding access to knowledge. Our open access initiatives make high-quality scholarship available worldwide, regardless of institutional affiliation or financial means, extending the reach of our authors' work—especially to underserved communities. This year, two UC Press titles received coveted Open Access Book Prizes from the American Council of Learned Societies: *Archipelago of Resettlement: Vietnamese Refugee Settlers and Decolonization across*

From Scholarship to National Spotlight:

A. Mechele Dickerson

Following a widely viewed interview with Jon Stewart on *The Daily Show*, A. Mechele Dickerson's *The Middle-Class New Deal: Restoring Upward Mobility and the American Dream* rose to No. 5 on *The New York Times* nonfiction paperback bestseller list. This achievement reflects both the strength of Dickerson's scholarship and the effectiveness of our efforts to connect her and her work with broad audiences.

This momentum led to additional appearances on PBS's *Amanpour & Company*, Yahoo Finance, and prominent podcasts including those hosted by Chuck Todd and the *Financial Times*. Dickerson's success illustrates how UC Press authors, many of whom identify as scholar-activists, bring academic research into public discourse in ways that are both accessible and impactful.

Innovation and New Directions: Hip Hop Studies

To open fresh lines of inquiry and tackle emerging issues in a sustained way, UC Press develops innovative book series.

In recent years, the Press has launched series on AI, critical refugee studies, global musicology, and antiracism in the legal profession. This year brought the sixth volume in our Hip Hop Studies series, *In the Hour of Chaos: Art and Activism with Public Enemy's Chuck D*.

Expansive Reach

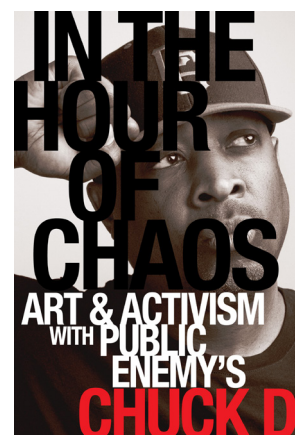
We support the reach of our authors and their ideas through strategic, data-informed marketing efforts. The Press attracts nearly 2 million

annual website visitors and executes hundreds of targeted email campaigns across disciplines, reaching thousands of readers and faculty for each campaign. Across our active social media channels, we have a combined followership of 65,000, with Instagram and Bluesky continuing to have the most engaged audiences.

We also engage directly with booksellers and publishing professionals through events such as the American Booksellers Association's Winter Institute. Author Scott Kurashige joined us at Winter Institute's IGNITE: BIPOC Bookseller Pre-Con, where he signed galleys of *American Peril: The Violent History of Anti-Asian Racism* and built meaningful connections with booksellers. These interactions strengthen relationships that translate into increased discoverability and hands-on advocacy for our books in retail spaces.

Our campaigns also extend through partnerships with mission-aligned platforms and curated digital storefronts, where thematic collections, seasonal features, and targeted promotions help connect readers with books that speak to their interests, values, and curiosities. From "The History and Evolution of Film" to "Queering Academia," our curated reading lists invite readers into timely conversations and discoveries across disciplines.

Our conference presence spans many of the leading scholarly and professional associations across the humanities and social sciences, giving us broad visibility among researchers, instructors, librarians, and academic decision-makers. We regularly participate in major national meetings such as those of the American Sociological Association, American Anthropological Association, American Studies Association, and American Historical Association, along with key disciplinary gatherings in religion, law, geography, art, economics, Asian studies, Latin American studies, and media studies. Our editors and marketing staff attend author panels, meet with current and prospective authors, display our latest books and journals, and take the temperature of the latest research in the field.

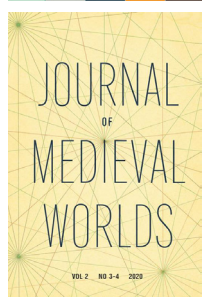
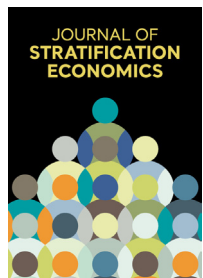

JOURNALS

UC Press remains a highly respected publisher of scholarly journals, which serve as an integral part of our publishing program. We publish 44 journals in a wide variety of subject areas and disciplines, primarily in the humanities and social sciences, and many in collaboration with respected scholarly organizations.

This year alone, our journals program published more than 1,700 articles, essays, book reviews, and other content contributed by thousands of authors, editors, and peer reviewers from around the world. This remarkable international network of partners strengthens our program—bringing diverse perspectives, deep expertise, and a truly global exchange of ideas that enriches every publication we produce.

In a year marked by conflict and the spread of misinformation that tests democratic institutions in the United States and around the world, our journals publish work that helps us better understand and address these urgent times. Examples from this year include:

Impact

- 77% of our journals are indexed in SCOPUS
- 59% of our SCOPUS indexed journals experienced an increase in their CiteScores
- *Global Perspectives* received the largest CiteScore increase
- 73% of our journals have impact factors
- 53% of our ranked journals experienced an increase in their impact factors
- *Classical Antiquity* and *Journal of Religion and Popular Culture* received the largest impact factor increases
- *Latin American and Latinx Visual Culture* is now indexed in the Emerging Sources Citation Index and has received its first impact factor

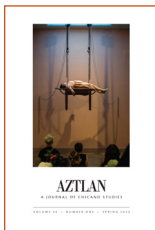

This year marked an expansion of the UC Press journals program into podcasting. Through several exciting podcast

initiatives, we are excited to share scholarship, ideas, and public conversations through this dynamic medium.

- The UC Press journals program has launched a new podcast series, *Periodically*, featuring conversations with authors, editors, and publishing professionals. *Periodically* explores new research, the scholarly publishing process, and ideas shaping contemporary academic discourse.
- *Global Perspectives* has partnered with the Center for New Critical Politics and Governance at Aarhus University and Hagen Schulz-Forberg, its director and coeditor of the journal, to publish episodes of the center's new podcast, *Planetary Choices*. The journal includes these "podcast articles" as part of its curated Viewpoints collections before wider release on major podcast platforms.
- *Gastronomica: The Journal for Food Studies* has relaunched the *Gastronomica* podcast in partnership with the New Books Network and UC Press, creating a space where the academic field of food studies engages with the broader public's interest in gastronomy, culture, and the culinary arts.
